<u>Funding for the dual status military technician (DSMT) program.</u> Nationwide, the National Guard had to internally overcome a payroll shortfall for our DSMTs this past fiscal year, and we expect a similar shortfall this FY26. Nearly half of our full-time workforce (800 Soldiers) are DSMTs who primarily work in readiness-generating fields like aircraft and vehicle maintenance, many at Camp Ripley. We stand to lose 10% of that workforce if the shortfall is not overcome.

Passing the Fighter Preservation and Recapitalization Act of 2025 (cosponsored by Sens. Smith and Klobuchar) and advocating for next generation fighters for the 148th Fighter Wing in Duluth. The U.S. Air Force fighter fleet is older, smaller, and less ready than it has been in over 50 years. This bill aims to support force-wide modernization while ensuring that Air National Guard (ANG) wings like our 148th are modernized in parity with active duty. The 148th Fighter Wing is uniquely well-suited and ready to receive F-35s – they are one of just two ANG wings in the country that execute the complex suppression of enemy air defense mission; they own the largest, most diverse air space in the continental US; and are consistently among the best manned and most ready units in the nation. However, because they fly the "newest of the old" F-16s, they are projected to be among the last ANG wings in the nation to be modernized. Rep. Stauber has been an incredible champion for this effort, and Sens. Klobuchar and Smith have also co-sponsored the legislation and expressed support.

Other key issues we've pursued this year include increased and more flexible funding for the State Partnership Program, which matches the Minnesota National Guard with the Croatian and Norwegian Armed Forces for mutually beneficial interoperability exchanges. Rep. Stauber put forward and passed a House NDAA floor amendment that would authorize 2-year funding for the program. We hope to see that in the final law!

A longer-term priority is military construction funding parity for the National Guard. The Army National Guard makes up 40% of the Army's footprint but is slated to receive just 4% of military construction funding. That figure has been gradually declining each year to this unsustainable low.

"Your voice matters. We encourage association members to contact your congressional and state representatives to: support new fighter aircraft for the 148th Fighter Wing in Duluth and advocate for adequate technician funding to preserve the full-time workforce critical to readiness. Highlights & Takeaways

Senior Leader Addresses

- Gen. Dan Caine (Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff) delivered the opening keynote, emphasizing: "When you mobilize the Guard, you mobilize the Nation."
- Gen. Steven S. Nordhaus (Chief, National Guard Bureau) underscored the Guard's enduring role across centuries (citing 1636) and the imperative of readiness for both homeland and overseas missions.
- Gen. Randy A. George (Army Chief of Staff) discussed transformation, modernization, and the vital contribution of the Guard to overall Army structure and capability.
- Gen. John D. Lamontagne (Commander, Air Mobility Command) recognized the Guard's membership in the air mobility, refueling and aeromedical missions and stated: "We cannot do our mission without this talented team."

Theme & Strategic Focus

- A dual focus on domestic missions (disaster relief, homeland security) and warfighting readiness (drone/AI threat, Indo-Pacific posture).
- One of the featured panel discussions addressed un-piloted aerial systems (UAS) and the growing importance of that domain. *Maj. Gen. Shawn Manke was part of the panel*.
- The role of the Guard as part of the total force: e.g., coverage that the Guard constitutes about 20 % of the joint force despite a smaller budget share.

Business & Governance

- Delegates approved resolutions that will form the basis of next year's legislative agenda. Minnesota National Guard submitted resolutions passed.
- Board elections and by-laws changes were held (or proposed).
- The industry exhibition was robust, reflecting the wide spectrum of Guard missions (Army, Air, domestic).

Networking & Social Elements

- Outside the formal sessions, the host city-programming leveraged Milwaukee's attractions: sport fishing on Lake Michigan, a Harley-Davidson ride in SE Wisconsin, golf tournament, mixers in the Deer District, harbor boat tours, a fireworks show.
- These social/networking activities underscored that the conference was not just business, but also about building relationships across states and components.


